

6th October 2025 Alice Foster

Giotto: Founder of Modern Art

Giotto, the first Italian master to achieve universal recognition in his own life time, initiated a new style of painting in the early



1300s which revolutionised art in western Europe. His work has a sense of drama through body language and facial expression, and clarity in terms of storytelling - so much so that his images are still easily readable 700 years on.

Masquerades, Music Lessons & Monkeys: 18th C Figurines

The fashion for porcelain figure sculpture in the eighteenth century reflected that society in miniature. There are characters

from the Commedia del'Arte and the English stage, beggars and pedlars, exotic figures from distant lands, lovers and musicians, shepherds and shepherdesses, the gods of Olympus – even the odd monkey!

The Art of Illusion

What are illusions, and why and how do they deceive us? With examples from artists such as Hogarth, Magritte and the extraordinary sculptures of Catalano, we will examine how illusions have been used both 'in art' and 'as art'.

Jazz - a fascinating blend of rigorous structure, free-



wheeling creativity, close-knit ensembles and imaginative improvisation. We hear of jazz from the early years up to the Second World War, and the influences on its emergence. Musical illustrations range from the blues and ragtime and the very first jazz recordings through to classics by Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington and the dawn of the Swing Era.

The Medieval Year in Art

The art of the late Middle

Ages gives us a vivid picture of life at the time, with detail and striking realism. Many recreate the atmosphere of the popular festivals, religious processions and mystery plays that were regular events in the lives of ordinary people. A typical year is Illustrated with rare manuscripts and artists such as Bruegel, Dürer and Botticelli.

Art of the Chalk Landscapes

Between the world wars a

group of British artists explored the downland of southern England, finding in the ancient landscapes of Sussex and Wessex inspiration for new work. Eric Ravilious and fellow artists Peggy Angus and Tirzah Garwood, William Nicholson, and John and Paul Nash led the way. These artists created paintings and prints that were defiantly modern, yet rooted in the past.

The Nation's Mantlepiece:

A History of the National Gallery in 10 Paintings



Founded by Parliament in 1824, the National Gallery houses one of the world's finest collections of European paintings, including Van Eyck's "Arnolfini Marriage", Botticelli's "Venus and Mars", Constable's "Cornfield" and Van Gogh's "Sunflowers". This lecture uses highlights from the collection to show how our vision of the "ideal" art collection has evolved over time.

The Fairer Sex: Women in Ancient Egyptian Art

Ancient Egyptian society was male-dominated, with the pharaoh at the apex of the social pyramid; but some of the most stunning images in ancient Egyptian art are of women.
